CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

I am pleased to report on many highlights that occurred at the Centre over the past year. Although we face many economic and operational challenges, we are happy to report growth and improvements in most facets of our business.

An increasingly low Canadian dollar makes attracting relevant, international artists difficult however the Conexus Arts Centre still managed to host a variety of events the entire community



could enjoy. From rock to country, classical to dance, comedy to Broadway the event calendar in our theatre was filled with standing ovations and glowing reviews.

In 2018-2019 we continued our strategy of working closely with key entertainment industry leaders to find creative ways to host more events. In the past 12 months our team self-promoted or co-promoted 17 concerts that would not have of performed in Regina without those relationships. We are working to harvest those relationships to further our goals.

The highlight for 2018 was the newly created and extremely successful Shake the Lake Musical Festival, which took place on our front lawn August 31 and Sept 1. Headlined by Trooper and Cheap Trick, Shake the Lake drew nearly 4000 fans per day and proved to be a very positive venture for the Centre.

The Centre also took over the operation of the cafeteria and catering services at the Saskatchewan Legislative Building on January 1, 2019. Our goal is that the Centre Café will positively augment our kitchen and catering operation at the Centre.

The Centre is entering our 49th year of operation. I would be remiss without acknowledging our partner and Landlord, Ministry of Central Services. Although significant future investments are required we are very much appreciative of the recent work that has been done and is on-going to ensure our facility is of the standard expected by our guests. In 2018 a major electrical refurbishment was completed and in 2019 we are slated for upgrades to our elevators and exit doors.

We must also thank and acknowledge our sponsors for their support, most specifically Conexus Credit Union. Our theatre sound and lighting systems, mainly original to the facility (nearly 50 years old), were in dire need of replacement. Our sponsors responded in our time of need and

in the 4th quarter we installed a new state of the art sound and lighting system that will benefit our clients for many years to come. This will not only bring our theatre to today's technological standards, but is also far more energy efficient and environmentally friendly.

Finally, and most importantly, I want to acknowledge the hard work of our staff and management team. It is our goal to host as many events as possible and to create memorable experiences. We do this day in and day out and it is part of what makes our community so great.





INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To:

The Members of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts, which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2019, and the statement of operations and accumulated surplus, statement of changes in net financial assets and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts as at March 31, 2019, and the result of its operations and accumulated surplus, change in its net assets, and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report, but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or any knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed on this other information, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact in this auditor's report. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards for Treasury Board's approval, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts' ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts' financial reporting process.

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Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts' internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts' ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control identified during the audit.

SASKATCHEWAN CENTRE OF THE ARTS (CONEXUS ARTS CENTRE) NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS March 31, 2019

1. Status of Centre

The Board of the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts is continued under *The Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts Act*, 2000, to maintain, operate and manage the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts in Regina. The Act also continued the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts Fund through which all financial transactions are conducted which relate to accomplishing the purposes of the Act.

Effective January 1, 2006 Conexus Credit Union made a donation to the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts in return for the naming rights of the building. The Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts building is now commonly called the Conexus Arts Centre.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

Pursuant to standards established by the Public Sector Accounting Board, the Conexus Arts Centre is classified as an "other government organization". These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards. These statements do not present a Statement of Remeasurement Gains and Losses as the Conexus Arts Centre has no remeasurement gains or losses.

The following accounting policies are considered to be significant:

a) Revenue recognition

Theatre revenue is recognized at the date of the performance and is recorded net of payments to promoters. Convention/Catering revenue is recognized at the date of the event.

b) Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided for using the straight-line method over the expected useful life (ranges from 3 to 10 years) of the tangible capital asset, with a full year's amortization taken in the year of acquisition.

Tangible capital assets are accounted for as non-financial assets by the Conexus Arts Centre because they can be used to provide services in future periods. These assets do not normally provide resources to discharge the liabilities of the Conexus Arts Centre unless they are sold.

The Conexus Arts Centre has the following five major capital asset categories:

c) Inventories held for resale and inventories held for consumption

Inventories consist of food which is held for consumption and liquor which is held for resale. Resale inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Inventory held for consumption is valued at cost.

d) Use of estimates

These statements are prepared in conformity with Canadian public sector accounting standards. These standards require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates relates to the useful lives of assets for amortization periods.

e) Financial Instruments

The Conexus Arts Centre's financial instruments are comprised of cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued charges, and advance sales and deposits. The carrying value of these financial instruments approximates their fair values as at March 31 due to their immediate or short-term nature.

f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Conexus Arts Centre's cash and cash equivalents consisted of \$1,289,640 cash and term deposits of \$1,000,000 (a 500,000 term which will mature on April 1, 2019 and has an annual interest rate of 1.2%, and a 500,000 term which will mature on February 8, 2020 and has an annual interest rate of 2.3%)

3. Financial Instrument Risks

The Conexus Arts Centre's financial risk relates primarily to credit risk from potential non-payment of accounts receivable. The maximum credit risk to which it is exposed at March 31, 2019 is limited to the carrying value of its accounts receivable. The allowance for doubtful accounts is \$0 (2018-\$0). Subsequent to the year-end, a significant amount of accounts receivable were collected reducing the credit risk. The Conexus Arts Centre's financial instruments do not have any significant interest rate risk or liquidity risk.

5. Budget

These amounts represent the budget approved by the Conexus Arts Centre's Board of Directors on March 13, 2018.

6. Related Party Transactions

Included in these financial statements are transactions with various Saskatchewan Crown corporations, ministries, agencies, boards and commissions related to the Conexus Arts Centre by virtue of common control by the Government of Saskatchewan, as well as its executive management personnel and their close family members (collectively referred to as "related parties"). Additionally, the Conexus Arts Centre is related to organizations where they have key management personnel and/or their close family members in common.

The building and site have been leased from the Ministry of Central Services (CS) to the Conexus Arts Centre for an annual rental of five dollars. The terms of the lease require the Conexus Arts Centre to keep the building, and all other property contained therein, in good repair and condition with the provision that any major maintenance, renovations and construction project costing in excess of \$15,000 shall be the responsibility of CS. The current lease arrangement expires May 31, 2026.

Routine operating transactions with related parties are recorded at the agreed upon rates and are settled on normal trade terms. The following table summarizes the significant routine related party transactions for the year.

Other transactions and amounts due to and from related parties are described separately in the financial statements and the notes thereto.

The Conexus Arts Centre collected and remitted Liquor Consumption Tax of \$71,430 (2018-\$57,602) to the Saskatchewan Ministry of Finance. In addition, the Conexus Arts Centre pays Provincial Sales Tax to the Saskatchewan Ministry of Finance on all its taxable purchases and services. In 2019 the Conexus Arts Centre remitted PST of \$119,528 (2018 - \$144,506). Taxes paid on purchases are recorded as part of the cost of those purchases. Taxes paid on services provided are shown separately on invoices.

7. Pension Plan

The Conexus Arts Centre participates in a defined contribution pension plan for the benefit of its employees. The Conexus Arts Centre's financial obligation to the plan is limited to making regular payments of 5% of employees' salaries (and 7.5% of International Association of Theatrical and Stage Employees permanent employees' salaries) for current service. The Conexus Arts Centre's annual pension expense for 2019 was \$120,758 (2018-\$121,954) and is included in salaries and benefits expense.

8. Comparative Figures

Certain comparative figures have been reclassified to conform to the current year's presentation.

It should be noted that the Special Event line item may vary from year to year dependant on the event included. For the 2017-18 fiscal year, the First Nations Aboriginal Games was identified as a special event. For the 2018-19 fiscal year, the Shake the Lake Festival was identified as a special event.
